Charles Rennie Mackintosh, a Scottish architect and designer, has been called a "purifier" ahead of his time. That is largely (1) he saw ways to reduce things to (2) elements. He found beauty in (3), even in pure geometric form. He was known (4) his decorative use of squares.

Mackintosh and his wife, a fellow student at the Glasgow School of Art, were two of "the Four" who established the Glasgow Style (5) the turn of the 20th century. Their aesthetic, or style, emphasized the vertical. It also included strange, curving, stretched-out human and plant images, similar (6) those of Art Nouveau in Europe. Yet from 1896 or earlier, abstract forms also started appearing in their works.

Mackintosh's highly vertical, black Ladderback Chair of 1904 is an example of his desire to make furniture design a part of interior decoration and even architecture. Two Ladderbacks formed the black "poles" of a master White Bedroom in a house he (7). The chairs look almost two-dimensional there: in (8) words, flat. Yet they "organize" the room powerfully.
